

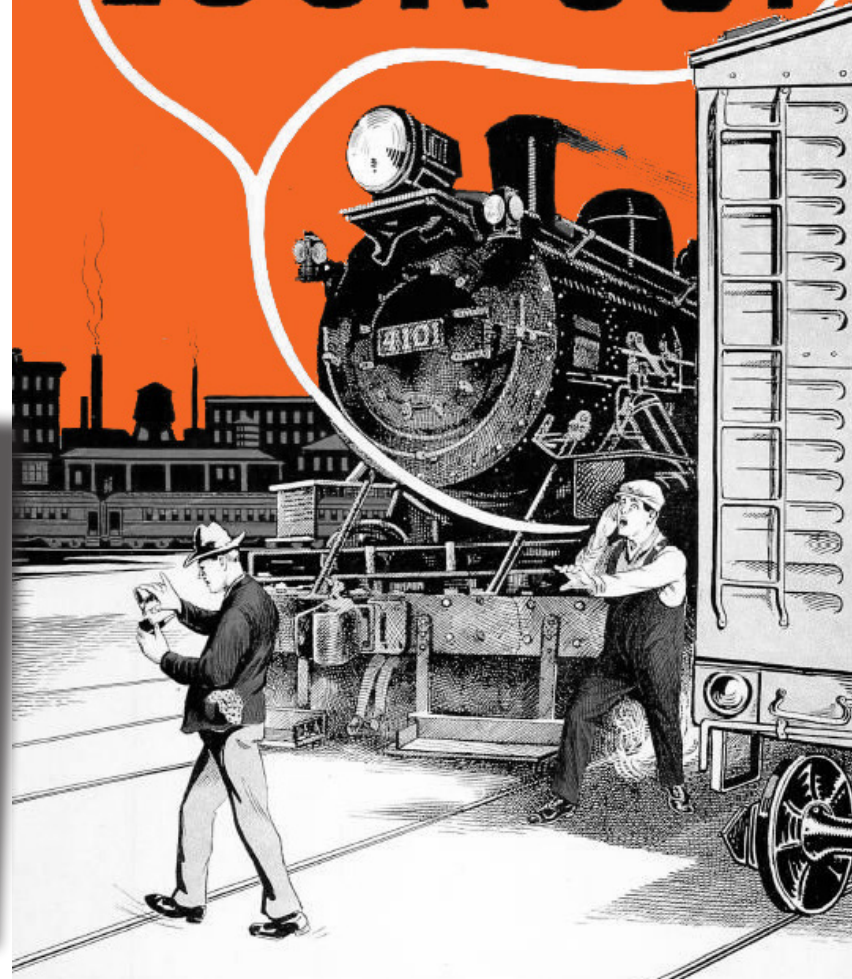
RAILROAD SAFETY REMINDERS!

It can take a mile or more to stop a train, so a locomotive engineer who suddenly sees someone on the tracks will likely be unable to stop in time. Railroad property is private property. For your safety, be sure to only cross if you are at a designated public crossing.





Always expect a train and remember that trains can come from either direction. Do not cross the tracks immediately after a train passes. A second train might be blocked by the first. Wait until you can see clearly around the first train in both directions.



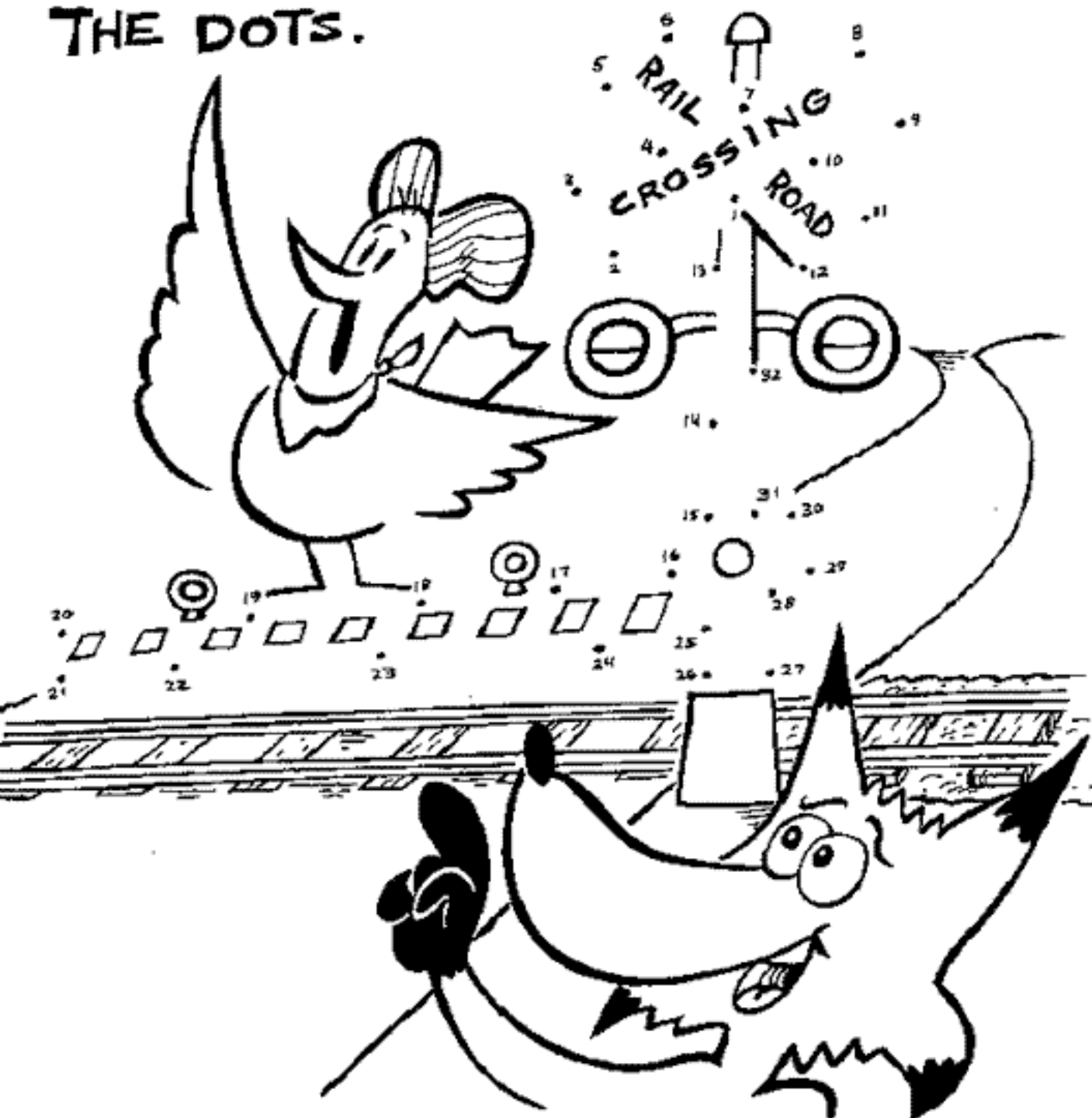
HEY! LOOK OUT

|  | ADVANCED WARNING SIGN warns that the road crosses railroad tracks ahead |  | ENS SIGN shows the railroad's emergency phone number and the crossing number (This is the first number you should call if there is an emergency) |
|  | CROSSBUCK which means you are at the railroad track |  | FLASHING RED LIGHTS if the red lights are flashing, it means there is a train coming |
